BOARD OF REGENTS BRIEFING PAPER

1. AGENDA ITEM TITLE: Procedure and Guidelines Manual Revision, Increases in Tuition and Fees,

Academic Years 26-27, 27-28, and 28-29

MEETING DATE: December 4-5, 2025

2. BACKGROUND & POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

Background

Following the presentation and discussion at the September 2025 quarterly Board meeting regarding the bridge funding authorized in Assembly Bill 568 of the 83rd regular session of the Nevada Legislature and comparison of NSHE institutions' funding relative to national and western peers, the Chancellor established an ad hoc committee to consider a proposal to raise registration fees and non-resident tuition. The proposed increase is in addition to the Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) adjustments and is being considered in accordance with the provisions of the Predictable Pricing Program policy, which provides for such a process in the event of an emergency or other extreme circumstances.

The Committee included stakeholders for the universities and colleges, with committee representatives from student government, institution presidents, institution business officers, and student affairs/student services. The committee met on three occasions during October, reviewing the analysis of the fee increase, including the estimated funding generated, while also considering the change the proposal would lead to in relation to the peer institution's tuition and fee comparison. The committee weighed concerns regarding potential impacts to access and affordability, balanced against concerns for institutions to have adequate funding to continue offering a high-quality education at a greater value than most regional and national peers.

Summary of Recommendation

Following review of several alternatives and the resulting impacts on tuition and fees, as well as projected revenue the alternatives would generate, the Committee recommends an increase in registration fees and non-resident tuition that is in addition to the HEPI increases already in place for fiscal years 2026-27, 2027-28, and 2028-29 as follows:

For full-time Nevada residents, the cost of this fee increase after full implementation in FY29 is approximately \$1,200 per year for UNLV and UNR students, approximately \$900 per year for NSU students, and approximately \$400 per year for CSN, GBC, TMCC, and WNC lower-division students, while upper-division rates will continue to be aligned with NSU undergraduate rates. These increases do not apply to dual/concurrent enrollment students or the UNLV and UNR professional school students.

The Committee also considered a recommendation to 'freeze' the Access set-aside for the universities and upper-division community college fees as a measure that would allow a smaller fee increase to generate more funds for the campus operating budgets. However, upon reviewing the projected fee revenue generated by the proposals and considering concerns regarding access, the Committee does not recommend any change in the Board's Access policy, and as such, the estimated revenue generated by the fee increase proposal reflects a continuation of both the 10% and 15% Access funds set-aside requirement.

Peer Tuition and Fee Comparison

Taking the fee increase of 12% for the four-year institutions and 9% for the two-year institutions into consideration and adjusting the fiscal year 2025 Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) tuition and fee survey data to reflect the full impact of the 12% and 9% fee increases suggests the NSHE institutions will remain affordable in comparison to peers.

The table below compares NSHE institutions to WICHE peers for resident students, taking into account registration fees and other mandatory fees paid by all students. The comparison reflects the full impact of the proposed increase and compares the student level ranking before and after the proposed increase (rank of 1 is most affordable/least expensive

within the peer group). UNLV and UNR comparison is within the 24 R1 institutions in the WICHE states. All others are compared to the statewide average for the 4-year and 2-year sectors.

Note: the above tables reflect only the state-supported operating budgets for the seven instructional budgets. This does not reflect non-formula budgets that do not receive funding from undergraduate and graduate student fees. The remaining unfunded salary adjustments only reflect that portion related to positions in the state-supported operating budgets.

Student Input and Engagement

Following the Board's September quarterly meeting, the Chancellor and Institution presidents, along with their staffs, have been engaging with students on all campuses. During this time period, the meetings provided an opportunity to hear concerns. The final recommendation took into consideration concerns heard at all institutions, including:

- No change to the Board's policy requiring a portion of registration fees to be set aside to provide Access grants and scholarships.
- A scaled phase-in of the fee increase from fiscal year 2027 through fiscal year 2029, resulting in a more level fee increase percentage when combined with the corresponding year's HEPI increase.

Other Measures

While the Committee supports the recommendation to raise fees as preferred over budget reductions in order to close the budget gap that would otherwise occur upon the expiration of the bridge funding, NSHE Institutions continue to seek opportunities to collaborate and leverage resources in a manner that has allowed the Institutions to be value leaders among their national and regional peers. Examples of measures undertaken over the course of prior budget cycles include:

- System-wide enterprise system support for a single instance finance, human resources, and payroll business management system.
- System-wide shared administrative services, including cash management, operating pool, and endowment pool investment management, payroll administration, retirement plan administration, and insurance programs.
- System-wide software licensing and NevadaNet network management.
- Regional shared administrative services, including benefits administration, university police commands, and numerous shared services agreements between institutions in areas such as controllership operations, facility services, real estate management, and information technology.
- Shared allied health academic facilities, including high-cost simulation labs, at UNLV, CSN, and NSU.
- Shared system-wide learning concierge for the MGM College Opportunity Program.

3. SPECIFIC ACTIONS BEING RECOMMENDED OR REQUESTED:

Chancellor Matt McNair requests approval of the recommendation(s) by the Chancellor's ad hoc Committee to Recommend Board Action on Fee Increases. The recommendation for consideration by the Board is consistent with the intention of the Board of Regents Handbook, Title 4, Chapter 17, Section 1.2.c., which provides for additional fee increases under the NSHE Predictable Pricing Program due to emergency situations or extreme circumstances. Regents may consider approving the Committee's recommendation for approval and may also consider alternatives to the recommendation, including but not limited to fee increases higher or lower than the Committee's recommendation.

4. IMPETUS (WHY NOW?):

This fee proposal is necessary in order to replace bridge funding provided by the 83rd Nevada Legislature for the Institutions' fiscal years 2026 and 2027 operating budgets. Although the funding does not expire until July 2027, making this change now will allow the fee increases to be phased in over a three-year period and will provide the Institutions with the opportunity to build their 2027-29 biennial budgets with these revenues in place. 5. INDICATE HOW THE PROPOSAL SUPPORTS THE SPECIFIC STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL By ensuring adequate funding, NSHE institutions will have the opportunity to remain competitive by recruiting and retaining top faculty, delivering high-quality instruction, and maintaining academic and career support services that our students need to be successful. 7. BULLET POINTS TO SUPPORT REQUEST/RECOMMENDATION: To continue delivering high-quality education at a greater value than most regional and national peers, it is necessary to consider a gradual adjustment to tuition and fees to minimize the impact on students while replacing bridge funds and closing the projected budget gap. NSHE will continue to operate at a low cost compared to peers, while in spite of the comparatively low funding level, NSHE institutions have improved retention and graduation rates, and have strived to enhance student services. 8. POTENTIAL ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE REQUEST/RECOMMENDATION: Even though the cost and affordability comparative data suggests NSHE institutions will remain affordable in comparison to national and western region peers, any time fees are increased, there is a risk to access and affordability. 9. ALTERNATIVE(S) TO WHAT IS BEING REQUESTED/RECOMMENDED: Fees and non-resident tuition could be increased more or less than proposed, or not at all. Fee increases less than proposed will require budget reductions to be prepared in order to plan for the expiration of bridge funding. 10. RECOMMENDATION FROM THE CHANCELLOR'S OFFICE: The Chancellor's Office recommends approval of the proposal as supported by the Committee. 11. Nevada's 2-year institutions were 6th most affordable when compared to WICHE state peers for resident students based on academic year 2024-25 survey of tuition and mandatory fees for full-time students.

Had the proposed 9% fee increase been fully implemented for academic year 2024-25, Nevada's 2-year institutions would have been 8th of 14, approximately equal to the WICHE average.

Nevada's 4-year institutions were 7th most affordable when compared to WICHE state peers for resident undergraduate students based on academic year 2024-25 survey of tuition and mandatory fees for full-time students when comparing the weighted average tuition and fees for UNLV, UNR, and NSU.

Comparing NSU separately from the R1 institutions, and taking into consideration the full impact of the 12% fee increase proposal as if implemented for the 2024-25 survey period, NSU would rank 2nd most affordable at \$7,623 tuition and mandatory fees while UNLV and UNR would rank 11th when compared to all 4-year WICHE institutions.

Nevada's 4-year institutions were 3rd most affordable when compared to WICHE state peers for resident graduate students based on academic year 2024-25 survey of tuition and mandatory fees for full-time students when comparing the weighted average tuition and fees for UNLV, UNR, and NSU.

Comparing NSU separately from the R1 institutions, and taking into consideration the full impact of the proposed 12% fee increase as if implemented for the survey period academic year 2024-25, NSU would rank 2nd most affordable at \$7,623 tuition and manadatory 1st while UNLV and UNR would rank 11th when compared to tuition and mandatory 7th for resident students including all 4-year WICHE institutions.

For full-time non-resident graduate students, had the full impact of the proposed 12% fee increase been implemented for the 2024-25 academic year, NSU non-resident tuition and mandatory fees would have still been \$3,223 below the WICHE average and UNLV and UNR would have been \$2,559 higher than the WICHE average for all four-year institutions.

Comparing UNLV and UNR's undergraduate resident tuition and mandatory fees to their R1 WICHE peers in the 2024-25 survey, UNLV and UNR were 4th and 5th most affordable of 27 R1 institutions in WICHE states.

Adjusted to reflect the full impact of the proposed 12% fee increase, UNLV and UNR would have been 5th and 7th most affordable of the 27 institutions and still 18+% below the median of the peer group.
