BOARD OF REGENTS BRIEFING PAPER

Agenda Item Title: <u>Honorary Doctorate Exemption for a Public Official and subsequent</u> approval to award an Honorary Doctorate to Regent Thalia Dondero

BACKGROUND & POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

Thalia Dondero is a true advocate of higher education in the State of Nevada, and has served since 1996 as a Regent for the Nevada System of Higher Education. (NSHE). A better part of Regent Dondero's life has been profoundly immersed in serving her community and making Las Vegas a fine place to live, work and raise a family. Her civic and professional affiliations include the areas of education, law enforcement, health care, civic engagement, and environmental protection. The voluminous number of awards and commendations she has received are too numerous to mention. These honors deserve to be recognized in as many ways as possible. Under current guidelines (Procedures & Guidelines Manual, Chapter 8, Section 1), a public elected official is not eligible to receive an Honorary Degree while holding office. The University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV) is asking the NSHE Board of Regents to waive that limitation clause to allow UNLV to award Regent Dondero with its highest honor, an Honorary Doctorate.

SPECIFIC ACTIONS BEING RECOMMENDED OR REQUESTED:

The requested action is for the NSHE Board of Regents to waive the limitation that a person who holds public elective office is not eligible for nomination of an Honorary Doctorate; and, further, to approve the nomination of Regent Thalia Dondero for an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

IMPETUS (WHY NOW?):

Regent Thalia Dondero's commitment and dedication to the causes of education and civic duty are exemplary and should be recognized as often, and as publicly, as possible. The University of Nevada, Las Vegas is long overdue in requesting approval to grant an Honorary Degree to Regent Dondero.

3. Honorary degrees shall be awarded to persons who have made significant contributions to the improvement of the quality of academic programs and academic life at one of the NSHE's institutions. Persons currently holding public elected office are not eligible for the degree except in extraordinary circumstances.

Regent Thalia Dondero is a true trailblazer with a steadfast determination to do whatever is necessary to develop and improve the community, in its broadest sense of the word. Not only is she an exemplary advocate for civic responsibility, she is a proactive champion for accessibility of higher education to every person who desires to achieve that goal.

Most recently, Thalia Dondero was a recipient of the prestigious 2006 Education Hero Award given by The Public Education Foundation, dedicated to improving public education in Southern Nevada. This award recognizes and honors individuals throughout the State of Nevada who have made significant civic and charitable contributions impacting public education. She has been selected as an "Education

Hero" because of her distinguished service to children. "A Hero Named Thalia", the very first book in the Public Education Hero's Series was written by her daughter, Marilyn Dondero Loop, in honor of this award.

Thalia Dondero has, indeed, made a career of humanity. She was active in Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, the Las Vegas High School Booster Club, and was president of the Junior League of Las Vegas.

In 1974, Mrs. Dondero was the first woman elected to the Clark County Board of Commissioners. She served 20 years as a commissioner, including three terms as Chairman and one term as Vice-Chair. Included among the countless hours she has spent during this time to improve the quality of life in Clark County are overseeing the construction of the McCarran International Airport; expanding the University Medical Center; and, outlining new county townships.

Another great passion of Mrs. Dondero is her love for the environment. She served on the Nevada State Parks Board while she was instrumental in securing most of the state parks in Southern Nevada, including Red Rock State Park. This passion for the environment was further demonstrated by her work with the Bureau of Land Management to name the area from Mt. Charleston to Red Rock Canyon a national conservation and recreation area.

In 1996, Thalia Dondero was elected to the Nevada System of Higher Education (NSHE) Board of Regents having served two terms as Chair, and one term as Vice Chair. Currently, she is Chair of the Investment Committee and serves on the Cultural Diversity and Security Committee; the Board Development Committee; and, the Research and Economic Development Committee.

She also currently serves on the Summerlin Hospital Board of Trustees and the Bureau of Land Management Resource Advisory Council.

Often considered the "peaceful warrior", Thalia Dondero has committed herself and her life to the noble struggle for human rights. It is with extreme honor and pride, therefore, that the University of Nevada, Las Vegas nominates Thalia Dondero for the Honorary Doctorate degree.

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NEVADA SYSTEM OF HIGHER EDUCATION PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES MANUAL

CHAPTER 8

DEGREES AND AWARDS

Section 1. Distinguished Nevadan and Honorary Degree Nominations

1. Distinguished Nevadans

- a. Nominations for the award of Distinguished Nevadan will be made by the Board of Regents. Nominations must be received by the Chief Administrative Officer of the Board no later than December 31 of each academic year. The Board of Regents shall make the award on or before March 31 of each academic year.
- b. The purpose of the awards is to recognize prominent individuals who are present or former residents of the state for their significant achievements contributing to the cultural, economic, scientific, or social advancement of Nevada and its people; or for exceptional service to the state or nation that has influenced constructively the well-being of humankind. Persons currently holding public elective office shall not be eligible to be nominated for Distinguished Nevadan, except that the Board of Regents reserves the right to waive this limitation at its own discretion in extraordinary circumstances.
- c. No more than five persons per year shall be given the award of Distinguished Nevadan by the Board of Regents (one north, one south, one rural, two at large). These awards shall normally be given at spring commencement exercises.

2. Honorary Doctorates

- a. Nominations for Honorary Doctorates shall be made to the Board of Regents by the Presidents of the University of Nevada, Las Vegas and the University of Nevada, Reno.
- b. Honorary Doctorates may, at the discretion of the university Presidents and with the approval of the Board of Regents, be conferred at any time during the year at an appropriate ceremony. Normally, no more than two honorary doctorates will be conferred at each university's commencement ceremony.
- c. Honorary Doctorates shall be awarded to persons who have made significant contributions to the improvement of the quality of academic programs and academic life at each university, or to distinguished visitors. Persons currently holding public elective office shall not be eligible to be nominated for an Honorary Doctorate, except that the Board of Regents reserves the right to waive this limitation at its own discretion in extraordinary circumstances. 3. Honorary Baccalaureate Degrees

- a. Nominations for Honorary Baccalaureate Degrees shall be made to the Board of Regents by the Presidents of Nevada State College and Great Basin College.
- b. Exclusive of a yearly commencement speaker for each college, normally no more than two persons per year for each college shall be awarded Honorary Baccalaureate Degrees by the Board of Regents.
- c. Honorary Baccalaureate Degrees shall be awarded to persons who have made significant contributions to the improvement of the quality of academic programs and academic life at each college, or to distinguished visitors. Persons currently holding public elective office shall not be eligible to be nominated for an Honorary Baccalaureate Degree, except that the Board of Regents reserves the right to waive this limitation at its own discretion in extraordinary circumstances.

4. Honorary Associate Degrees

- a. Nominations for Honorary Associate Degrees shall be made to the Board of Regents by the Presidents of Community College of Southern Nevada, Truckee Meadows Community College and Western Nevada Community College.
- b. Exclusive of a yearly commencement speaker for each community college, normally no more than two persons per year for each community college shall be awarded Honorary Associate Degrees by the Board of Regents.
- c. Honorary Associate Degrees shall be awarded to persons who have made significant contributions to the improvement of the quality of academic programs and academic life at each community college, or to distinguished visitors. Persons currently holding public elective office shall not be eligible to be nominated for an Honorary Associate Degree, except that the Board of Regents reserves the right to waive this limitation at its own discretion in extraordinary circumstances.
