INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

During the summer of 2022, I had the honor of becoming the new Athletics Director at the University of Nevada, Reno. At this time, the Nevada Wolf Pack had just ended its 2021-22 academic and sports season, and started ramping up for the 2022-23 season. Upon my arrival, I had the opportunity to learn about what the 2021-22 season brought our program and how we can start preparing for the following season.

I was pleased to learn that our student-athletes produce positive academic results. The spring of 2022 was our 16th consecutive semester of a department GPA over a 3.0 with 206 student-athletes earing over a 3.0 GPA and 28 of those were perfect 4.0s. 176 of our student-athletes were named Academic All-Mountain West lists during the 2021- 22 academic year. We proudly graduated 33 student-athletes at the 2021 Winter Commencement Ceremony and 89 student-athletes at the 2022 Spring Commencement Ceremony; our graduation rate for the 2021-22 academic year was 89%.

Our program is dedicated to community engagement and service. I am proud to share that our student-athletes volunteered their time at the Boys & Girls Club of Truckee Meadows, Pack Provisions, Northern Nevada Children's Center, Special Olympics, Kings Row Community Life Center, Sparks Middle School, Challenger League, Renown Children's Hospital and many more. These dedicated hours of service resulted in us winning the Mountain West Student-Athlete Advisory Council Community Service Award in 2021-22.

The Nevada Wolf Pack athletics teams continued striving for excellence. Below are a few highlights from the 2021-22 athletic year:

Nevada Football won eight games in 2021 and made an appearance at the 2021 Quick Lane Bowl in Detroit.

Nevada had 15 student-athletes earn a total of 16 All-Mountain West honors.

Nevada Men's Tennis claimed its first regular season and conference Championship since 1982.

For the first time in program history, Nevada Women's Golf had two student-athletes qualify as individual entries to an NCAA Regional.

Nevada Women's Basketball won 20 games in 2021-22, its first 20-win season since 2010-11.

Nevada successfully defended the Silver State Series trophy against UNLV, defeating the Rebels 27-18 in the annual competition.

I am excited about what I have seen both on and off the field during my first six months at Nevada. We are headed towards a bright future and I am confident that our student-athletes, coaches and staff will work tirelessly to build this program. We are forever grateful for the support given from the Nevada System of Higher Education, the University of Nevada, Reno and President Brian Sandoval. We look forward to strengthening the relationship with campus administrative and academic leadership.

Thank you for the time to share highlights from the 2021-22 year. I am looking forward to what the coming years will bring.

YEAR IN REVIEW

The University of Nevada, Reno announced on June 21 that Stephanie Rempe would be the next Athletics Director at Nevada. Rempe comes to Nevada from LSU, where she served as the Executive Deputy Director of Athletics/Chief Operating Officer since 2019. Prior to her stop in Baton Rouge, Rempe spent time at Texas A&M (2016-19) as Chief Operating Officer, with stops at Washington (2008-16), Oklahoma (2003-08), UTEP (1998-2003), and Arizona (1995-98).

Nevada successfully defended the Silver State Series trophy against UNLV, defeating the Rebels, 27-18, in the annual competition. The Wolf Pack captured the full three points in the competitions in football, women's soccer, women's cross country, men's tennis, men's golf, baseball, women's track & field, and academics (APR).

Nevada Football won eight games in 2021 and made an appearance at the 2021 Quick Lane Bowl in Detroit. Junior quarterback Carson Strong was named the Mountain West's Offensive Player of the Year for the second-straight season – just the fifth player in Mountain West history to win the award in back-to-back seasons.

Nevada had 15 student-athletes earn a total of 16 All-Mountain West honors. The 15 honorees matched the school record set the previous season (2020).

Nevada announced Ken Wilson as the 27th head coach of Nevada Football on Dec. 10, 2021. Wilson, who returned to Reno after serving most recently as the co-defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Oregon, had previously spent 19 years on the Nevada staff (1989-98, 2004-12), which included five seasons as associate head coach (2008-12) and four as defensive coordinator (1996-98, 2007).

Nevada Men's Tennis claimed its first conference championship since 1982 when it captured both the Mountain West regular season and tournament titles. The Wolf Pack went 19-8 on the year (5-1 MW), and defeated San Diego State and New Mexico at the Mountain West Championship to earn the first NCAA Tournament bid in program history.

Nevada Men's Golf finished third at the 2022 Mountain West Championships, and went on to earn an at-large bid to the NCAA Stockton Regional. The postseason bid was the fourth in a row for the Wolf Pack.

Two Wolf Pack head coaches were named Mountain West Coach of the Year in 2021-22: Sylvain Malroux (Men's Tennis) and Jacob Wilner (Men's Golf).

Nicola Ader was named an NCAA Woman of the Year nominee, as she concluded her standout Nevada career as a seven-time track-and-field All-American.

Ader earned her seventh-career All-America honor with a ninth-place finish in Heptathlon at the 2022 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, in Eugene, Ore.

Freshman Tierney Wolfgram qualified for the NCAA Cross Country Championships in November 2021, becoming just the second Wolf Pack runner to qualify for the national meet, and the first to compete in it. Wolfgram was named All-Mountain West Second Team for her performance at the 2021 Mountain West Championships.

Nevada Swim and Dive had two student-athletes qualify for the 2022 NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships, held in Atlanta. Swimmer Donna dePolo and diver Laura Isabel Vazquez Lopez each qualified for the second times in their respective careers. dePolo competed in the 100 and 200 breaststroke events, while Vazquez competed on 1-meter springboard and platform.

Swimmer Donna dePolo also earned national recognition for her academic achievements. In June, she was named to the CoSIDA All-America At-Large Second Team, in recognition of her 3.94 grade-point average, majoring in physics with minors in mathematics, geological sciences, and astronomy.



Nevada Women's Basketball won 20 games in 2021-22, it's first 20-win season since 2010-11. The Wolf Pack finished fourth in the Mountain West (11-7 in conference play), and finished fourth at the Women's Basketball Invitational. It was the Pack's fifth postseason appearance overall, and first since also going to the WBI in 2018.

Nevada Women's Track and Field matched its highest-ever finish at the Mountain West Outdoor Track and Field Championships in May 2022, finishing fourth with 91 points. Overall, Wolf Pack student-athletes earned nine medals (one gold, four silver, four bronze).

Four Nevada student-athletes qualified for the NCAA West Preliminary meet in Fayetteville, Ark. Nicola Ader (Long Jump), Emily Costello (200 Meters, 400 Meters), Hailey Dolcini (Pole Vault), and Iesha Hamm (High Jump) all qualified.

For the first time in program history, Nevada Women's Golf had two golfers qualify as individual entries to an NCAA Regional. Seniors Victoria Gailey and Leah John earned individual bids to the Stanford Regional in May. Gailey was also named to the All-Mountain West Second Team, the third-such time in her career.

The University of Nevada, Reno again won the Mountain West Student-Athlete Advisory Council Community Service Award in 2021-22. Nevada has won the conference's top community service award in five of the last eight years.

Track and field All-American Nicola Ader and Baseball standout Josh Zamora were honored as the Wolf Pack's outstanding senior student-athletes, winning the Ruth Russell and Doc Martie Awards, respectively, for 2021-22.

Football's Christian Swint and administrative assistant Janet May earned the department's Give Back Like Jack awards for their community service endeavors throughout the year. The department presents the award annually to those who best exemplify the dedication to community service that was the hallmark of longtime Reno/Sparks philanthropist Jack Reviglio's life.

Nevada Women's Soccer set the program record for wins (four) and points (14) since joining the Mountain West in 2012. The Pack went 4-5-2 in conference play in 2021, and defeated arch-rival UNLV, 1-0, in the season finale.

Ninety-one (91) current and former Nevada student-athletes graduated during the 2021-22 academic year. Thirty-three (33) current and former student-athletes were honored at Winter 2021 Commencement, while 58 were honored at Spring Commencement in May 2022.

A total of 176 Nevada student-athletes were named to the Academic All-Mountain West lists during the 2021-22 academic year. Twenty-three members of the Wolf Pack football team were honored on the Fall List.

When timelines permit, a diverse search committee is assembled.

Committee members review resumes and identify their top candidates.

Approval of the candidate and interview pools is required for positions with an Affirmative Action placement goal.

Once approval is granted initial phone/virtual interviews are conducted.

Committee identifies the candidates who will become finalists.

Finalists are interviewed and the search committee meets to make their final decision.

Selected finalist is submitted to Human Resources for approval. Once approved an offer is made.

COVID-19 impact on future projections: COVID-19 continues to have a lasting impact on our operation thus making it difficult to accurately project future years. ICA continues to monitor the impact and make operational adjustments as necessary to provide safe opportunities for our student athletes to compete and for fans to attend events. For example, we entered FY22 expecting full attendance for our Basketball teams. A decision was made at the start of the season (after the budget process) that we would require vaccination in order to attend basketball games in Lawlor Events Center.

ICA State: Budget reflects anticipated state funding for ICA provided by UNR PBA, no projections made for future years and updates will be made as funding information is released.

Internal Revenues: For FY23, matched a non-COVID-19 FY21 projection and increased Football, Men's Basketball and all other sports 3% each year from FY2024-2027 (2% used for all other sports).

Football guarantees continue to be a significant source of revenue and have been projected at the amounts contracted for competitions from FY2024-FY2027. Learfield sponsorship guarantee has been projected at the amount contracted for years FY2024-FY2027.

Student Fees: No projected increases in student fee revenue. This will be adjusted as provided information from PBA

Gift Revenue: We have projected a 3% annual increase in gift revenue for the years FY2024-FY2027.

Institution Revenues: Department needs will be assessed on an on-going basis to determine the type of additional gift and internal revenue that can be generated to support Athletics. Additional University support will be determined if necessary through regularly occurring budget discussions and projections.

Tuition & Fee Waivers: We generally see tuition & fee waiver fluctuations year to year depending on the make up of our student athletes. We have projected an amount in line with prior years. Expenditures: We have projected a 2.5% annual increase for expenses. Based on these projections we estimate that a breakeven year for ICA will be dependent on increased fundraising and additional University support. The expenditure amount will be fully developed during the updated budgeting and projection process currently being implemented and will be applied for FY24. Examples of items that may have a larger impact (>2.5%) on future projections include but are not limited to: COLA, fringe benefit rate changes, student athlete financial aid, home game operations, deferred maintenance needs, team travel costs etc.

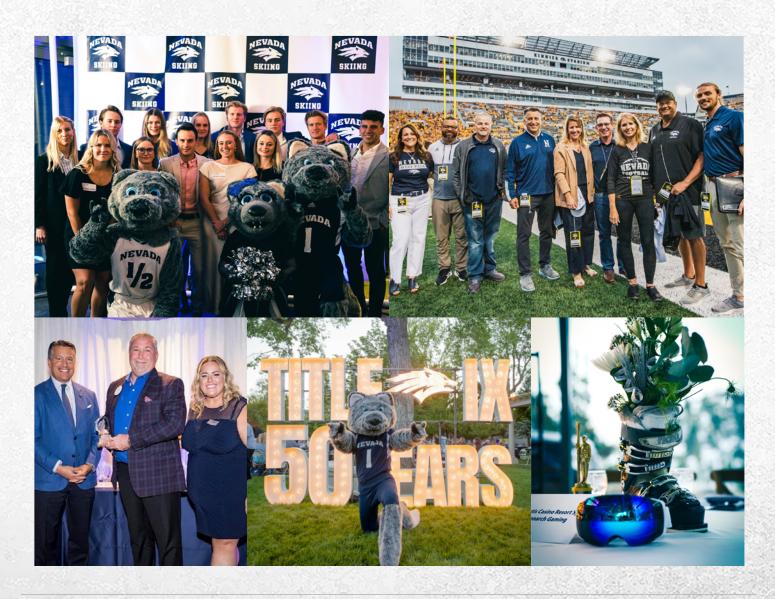

ACADEMICS

SPECIAL ADMISSIONS/SUMMARY

- During the 2021-2022 academic year, the total number of students, both first year and transfer, admitted through the special admissions process was 578 of which 19 were student-athletes.
- The top majors among student-athletes are: Human Development and Family Science (55), Public Health (44), Pre-Business Administration (31), Management (30), and Interdisciplinary Studies (25). The majors of all University of Nevada, Reno student-athletes are attached.
- Based on the NCAA Graduation Rate Report, the University of Nevada, Reno has a graduation rate of 89% compared to the rest of the student population who graduated at a 62% rate during the same time period.

APR DATA

Implemented in 2003 as part of an ambitious academic reform effort in Division I, the Academic Progress Rate (APR) holds institutions accountable for the academic progress of their student-athletes through a team-based metric that accounts for the eligibility and retention of each student-athlete for each academic term.

The APR emerged when Division I presidents and chancellors sought a timelier assessment of academic success at colleges and universities. At the time, the best measure was the graduation rate calculated under the federally mandated methodology that was based on a six-year window and did not take transfers into account.

The APR system includes rewards for superior academic performance and penalties for teams that do not achieve certain academic benchmarks. Data are collected annually, and results are announced in the spring.

The Division I Committee on Academics (CoA) oversees the Academic Progress Rate as part of its responsibilities with the Academic Performance Program. The CoA sets policies and recommends legislative changes to the I Board of Directors which has the final say on Division changes in Division I.

The NCAA benchmarks regarding each sport team's Academic Progress Rate (APR) at the University of Nevada, Reno must earn a four-year APR of 930 to be eligible for postseason competition (e.g., NCAA championships, CBI tournament, bowl games, etc.). https://www.ncaa.org/sports/2013/11/20/division-i-academic-progress-rate-apr.aspx The APR for each sport at the University of Nevada, Reno exceeds the 930-postseason requirement. NCAA DIVISION I GRADUATION RATES INSTITUTION REPORT INFORMATION

The following data and the NCAA Division I Graduation Rates Institution Report have been prepared by the NCAA, based on data provided by the institution in compliance with NCAA Bylaw 18.4.2.2.1 (admissions and graduation-rate disclosure) and the federal Student Right-to-Know Act. Please note, the NCAA will make this report public.

The Graduation Rates Institution Report gives graduation information about the most recent six-year graduating class of students and student-athletes who entered as freshmen in 2015-16. The graduation rate (percent) is based on a comparison of the number (N) of students who entered a college or university and the number of those who graduated within six years. For example, if 100 students entered and 60 graduated within six years, the graduation rate is 60%.

The Graduation Rates Institution Report provides information about two groups of students:

1. ALL STUDENTS

All undergraduate students who were enrolled in a full-time program of studies for a baccalaureate degree; and student-athletes.

2. STUDENT-ATHLETES

Student-athletes who received athletics aid from the school for any period of time during their entering year. [Note: Athletics aid is a grant, scholarship, tuition waiver or other assistance from a college or university that is awarded on the basis of a student's athletics ability.]

Two different measures of graduation rates are presented in this report: Federal Graduation Rate and NCAA Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR). The Federal Graduation Rate indicates the percentage of freshmen who entered and received athletics aid during a given academic year who graduated within six years. The GSR adds to the first-time freshmen, those students who entered midyear as well as student-athletes who transferred into an institution and received athletics aid.

Both the Federal Graduation Rate and the GSR subtract students from the entering cohort who are considered allowable exclusions (i.e., those who either die or become permanently disabled, those who leave the school to join the armed forces, foreign services or attend a religious mission). In addition, the GSR subtracts those who left the institution prior to graduation, had athletics eligibility remaining and would have been academically eligible to compete had they returned to the institution.

Graduation Rates Report

The box at the top of the Graduation Rates Institution Report provides the most recent class (i.e., 2015-16) and four-class Federal Graduation Rate (i.e., 2012-13 through 2015-16) for all students and for student-athletes who received athletics aid at this school. Additionally, this box provides GSR data (i.e., 2012-13 through 2015-16) for student-athletes.





Graduation-Rates Data

The second section of the report provides Federal Graduation Rate and GSR data for all students, student-athletes and student-athletes by sport group. (Note: Pursuant to the Student Right-to-Know Act, anytime a cell containing cohort numbers includes only one or two students, the data in that cell and one other will be suppressed so that no individual can be identified.)

- **1. All Students.** This section provides the freshman-cohort graduation rates for all full-time, degree seeking students by race or ethnic group. It shows the rate for men who entered as freshmen in 2015-16 and the four-class average, which includes those who entered as freshmen in 2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-15 and 2015-16. The same rates are provided for women. The total for 2015-16 is the rate for men and women combined, and the four-class average is for all students who entered in 2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-15 and 2015-16.
- **2. Student-Athletes.** This section provides the freshman-cohort graduation rates and the GSR for student-athletes in each race and ethnic group who received athletics aid. Information is provided for men and women separately and for all student-athletes.
- **3. Student-Athletes by Sports Categories.** This section provides the identified graduation rates as in 1-b for each of the eight sports categories. (The small letters indicate the value of N according to the legend at the bottom of 1-c.)

Undergraduate-Enrollment Data

- **1. All Students.** This section indicates the total number of full-time, undergraduate, baccalaureate, degree-seeking students enrolled for the 2021 fall term and the number of men and women in each racial or ethnic group (not just freshmen).
- **2. Student-Athletes.** This section identifies how many student-athletes were enrolled and received athletics aid for the 2022-22 academic year, and the number of men and women in each racial or ethnic group. - 1 Other categories may have cross-over with more specific applicable revenue/expense categories as we continue to utilize workday to classify transactions in more defined categories
- 2 Football operations will be impacted by the coaching staff turnover and making sure the new staff can implement their plan and also fill the roster needs through recruiting and the continue retention of current student athletes.
- 3 Sports were impacted by Air Quality in Reno during the Fall of 2021. This impact resulted in having teams practice remotely and reschedule home competitions to be hosted in other cities. Impact will total over \$680K in additional operating costs for FY22.
- 4 FY23 will experience unanticpated fluctations due to change in leadership and direction of the Athletic Department. Part of this involves revamping the entire process for budgeting and projecting future results. Additionally, we continue adapting our operation as necessary to meet the needs of our student athletes. Some of the major inititives already in process include mental health of our student athletes, nutrition, student experience, facility mainteance and improvement etc.

Projection Assumptions for FY2023-FY2027

COVID-19 impact on future projections: COVID-19 continues to have a lasting impact on our operation thus making it difficult to accurately project future years. ICA continues to monitor the impact and make operational adjustments as necessary to provide safe opportunities for our student athletes to compete and for fans to attend events. For example, we entered FY22 expecting full attendance for our Basketball teams. A decision was made at the start of the season (after the budget process) that we would require vaccination in order to attend basketball games in Lawlor Events Center.

ICA State: Budget reflects anticipated state funding for ICA provided by UNR PBA, no projections made for future years and updates will be made as funding information is released.

Internal Revenues: For FY23, matched a non-COVID-19 FY21 projection and increased Football, Men's Basketball and all other sports 3% each year from FY2024-2027 (2% used for all other sports).

Football guarantees continue to be a significant source of revenue and have been projected at the amounts contracted for competitions from FY2024-FY2027. Learfield sponsorship guarantee has been projected at the amount contracted for years FY2024-FY2027. We have projected an increase of 3% for NCAA & Mountain West Conference in years FY2024-FY2027.

Student Fees: No projected increases in student fee revenue. This will be adjusted as provided information from PBA

Gift Revenue: We have projected a 3% annual increase in gift revenue for the years FY2024-FY2027.

Institution Revenues: Department needs will be assessed on an on-going basis to determine the type of additional gift and internal revenue that can be generated to support Athletics. Additional University support will be determined if necessary through regularly occurring budget discussions and projections.

Tuition & Fee Waivers: We generally see tuition & fee waiver fluctuations year to year depending on the make up of our student athletes. We have projected an amount in line with prior years. Expenditures: We have projected a 2.5% annual increase for expenses. Based on these projections we estimate that a breakeven year for ICA will be dependent on increased fundraising and additional University support. The expenditure amount will be fully developed during the updated budgeting and projection process currently being implemented and will be applied for FY24. Examples of items that may have a larger impact (>2.5%) on future projections include but are not limited to: COLA, fringe benefit rate changes, student athlete financial aid, home game operations, deferred maintenance needs, team travel costs etc.
